

**THE MAIN PURPOSE OF OUR TRAVEL TO THE U.S.A. THIS YEAR WAS ICOM 2017.** The International Conference On Missions in Peoria, IL, was the CAPSTONE of CELEBRATING Osaka Bible Seminary's 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary year. Japan had been made the featured country of this missions conference attended by around 8,000 people. Brother Kishimoto and I were given the platform at a main session in which I shared a brief history of the 80 years since Osaka Bible Seminary was established and how "TOGETHER," the conference theme, our celebration had been made possible. Then I introduced Brother Kishimoto, our first post-war-born president, who expressed gratefulness for the American congregations' support over the years, especially for OBS. Four different Japan booths were situated on



the main aisle of the exhibit hall, and we spent most of our time at the OBS booth greeting people and sharing about OBS. Brother Kishimoto and I were also involved in workshops, and all of our group was invited to share about Japan and OBS in a special workshop.

**A TOTAL SURPRISE!** On Friday night of the conference we attended the Lincoln Christian University Reception and received a totally, unsuspected surprise (though our daughters knew!) when they presented me with the Restoration Award "For Outstanding Service in Missions"—from ordination 50 years. Then they called Rickie up to the platform and presented her with a Christian Service Award "For Faithful Service in Missions." They wanted to give us both Restoration Awards but someone had pointed out that Rickie was not a graduate of LCU, but of William Jessup University. :)



After ICOM we flew to Southern California and enjoyed a four-day visit with our son Jonathan and Sean. We celebrated Thanksgiving there after spending the day before at the beach in record 91 degree weather for that date!



We returned home to spend the week recovering and getting ready for our Christmas International Night, along with our regular schedules. We cooked two turkeys along with dressing and gravy and our guests brought other foods, including homemade cranberry sauce and sushi, to round out the meal. The games were especially fun and we had several first-time guests, one from as far away as Florida. My devotional talk was on the theme of "For the Joy set Before Him".
